
his mother for advice. She said that he had only promised not to tell a living person - he could tell a tree. So he went to where there was a large willow tree and he whispered the secret to the tree.





"Labhra Loinsigh has horse's ears, Labhra Loinsigh has horse's ears".



Saint Brigid's Church

Brigid was a beautiful young woman who lived in Ireland just after the time St. Patrick came here. She was so impressed with the faith that he had brought, that she decided she was going to be nun and spend all her life helping poor people. There were still many pagan chieftains in Ireland at that time and many of them wanted to marry Brigid because she was so beautiful. But she refused them all because she wanted to be a nun.



A chieftain in Leinster really wanted to marry her and he thought that if he brought her to his place and showed her all his land he would change his mind. He brought Brigid to where there was a great view over his property and there under a huge oak tree he

again asked Brigid to marry him. But she refused, saying that she really, really wanted to be a nun. He asked how could she be a nun when there was no convent or church for her to join.

So she asked him for some of his fine land to build a convent and a church on. But he was cross because she wouldn't marry him and said that he couldn't spare any. Looking over all his property she said,

"Could you not even give me the amount of land that my cloak would cover"? He knew that would not be nearly enough, for Brigid's cloak was just the size of an overcoat, so to stop her annoying him, he agreed.

Brigid took off her cloak and spread it on the ground under the mighty oak tree. And God worked a miracle and caused the cloak to spread and spread until it covered enough land for a church and a convent. The chieftain was so impressed that he gave her the land and became a Christian himself.

Today we remember St. Brigid by making a St. Brigid's Cross from rushes on her feast-day, the first of February - the first day of spring.
